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January 2018: heat and humidity, a storm, king tides, rain and a wastewater disaster

Well, what a start to 2018. Just a couple of days after New Year, ex-Tropical Cyclone Ita brought heavy seas and rain in conjunction with king tides. Grant Ewen's photo (R) shows the water sweeping over the Milford Rd seawall and up the street. No wonder there was rubbish strewn about, especially at Ocean View Rd.

Many seawall residents experienced damage to fences and gates. The Ocean View roadend had been very badly damaged back in the big January 2011 storm and it was pleasing to see that, in 2018, the new retaining walls built by the Council appeared totally undamaged. Council contractors also cleared the area of debris within a couple of days.





Widespread flooding was reported. Auckland was lucky compared to inundations at Maraetai, Kaiaua and the serious damage to the Thames to Coromandel Rd. Nevertheless, the northern motorway southbound was flooded for a time and questions need to be asked of local and central government about the raising of State Highway One between Esmonde and Onewa Rds.

The Wairau Creek (L) was also very high with many jetties under water and one launch holed and sunk.

NIWA warned a couple of years ago that we have moved from a 30 year cycle of predominantly westerly winds into a new cycle of easterly winds (as we have seen this year). In combination with the predicted increases in tides, there are some serious issues we will need to address as a coastal community.

Just three weeks later, over one hour on 23 January, torrential rain fell on the North Shore and Murray Hill from the Milford Business Assn captured photos of a raging Wairau Creek (over the page).

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Murray's 'before and after' photos of the Wairau Creek at the 'grille' – Council's official name is the Milford Trash Rack – give an idea of the huge volume of water travelling through the culvert and over the rack before it quickly dispersed and calmed in the wider area of the estuary. The photo below shows the rubbish in the Rack the next day.





There have been some suggestions that the rack needs to be made higher and stronger to catch rubbish in extreme events. Norma visited the site with Council staff last week and it was explained that this was a 1 in 80 year event and that to raise the rack would run the risk of flooding properties further upstream. The rack is cleared weekly.

Alma Rd Sewage Spill

This non-weather-related event on the Sunday of Anniversary Weekend was extremely traumatic for the families involved. It has been reported on the radio and in the local paper and Watercare's ongoing help for the families with the clean-up of their properties was praised this week.

It seems that a main sewerage pipe burst at about 1.30am and sewage was pumped at pressure over sections and entered some homes. The first call was to the Fire Brigade who thought they were dealing with a water main failure and contacted Watercare (2.49am). After the Watercare water specialist arrived and discovered it was wastewater, the wastewater emergency responder was sent (3.46am) and attempted to diagnose the fault and isolate the flow. At 5.04 am a Watercare emergency responders field team arrived to clear the work area and clean up the contamination area. The team was about 35 strong throughout the day.

At 8.35 am Watercare received permission from Vector to begin excavation of the site which was within the controlled zone of a major electrical carriageway and transformer. Digging work could not begin until access approval was granted. At 8.40 am Auckland Council Environmental Health Officer gave permission for the Watercare Wastewater pump station in Alma Road to be shut down. This meant that sewage instead flowed into the Wairau Creek and warnings were set up for swimmers at Milford Beach. By 11.30 am, earth moving equipment had carefully uncovered the broken pipe, located next to Vector cables. The repair was completed, tested and the pump station restarted by 6.00 pm. As we know, the Creek and Beach remained contaminated for the next 36-48 hours.

We are sure all Milford people feel a huge amount of sympathy for the Alma Rd families – it could have been any of our homes and properties – and well could be in the future. We have offered help if needed.

We will certainly be interested to read the final report on the failure of the pipe (at about half its life) and also feel that Council communications to swimmers and the surrounding community and to its own Actionline service could be improved. People living close to the creek also say that a strong smell is still present.
